

Master Abraham, as he was called, lead a very active life. He died at Quebec in 1644, and his widow remarried the following year to Rene Branche. His numerous descendants derive from his daughters, as the ~~only~~ only son which he left became the second native Canadian priest.

MORIN

Noel Morin, charron et tonnelier (Zacharie Joliet fut apprenti tonnelier chez Noel Morin), ne 1616, fils de Claude Morin et de Jeanne Moreau, de Saint Etienne de Compte Robert, en Brie, epousa a Quebec le 9 janvier 1649 Helene Desnortes, veuve de Guillaume Hebert. D'eux naquirent: "Germain Morin, premier pretre canadien et membre du Seminaire de Quebec, ou il laissa une belle reputation; Morin de Rochebelle, un des premiers enfants du pays qui aient ete appelees au conseil superieur de Quebec; Alphonse Morin, qui s'etablit a la Pointe a la Caille (St. Thomas, ou sa posterite porte le nom Morin-Valcourt.) Marie, la premiere Canadienne qui embrassa l'institut des hospitalier a Montreal: elle a ecrit les annales de l'Hotel-Dieu de cette ville." (Cf. Noel Morin, wheelwright and cooper (Zacharie Joliet was apprenticed as a cooper to Noel Morin), born in 1616, son of Claude Morin and Jeanne Moreau, of St. Etienne-de-Compte-Robert, in Brie, France, married at Quebec, Canada, on 9 January 1649 Helene Desnortes, widow of Guillaume Hebert. Of this union was born: "Germain Morin, the first native Canadian priest and a member of the Seminary of Quebec where he left a beautiful reputation; Morin de Rochebelle, one of the first children of the country to be called to the Superior Council of Quebec; Alphonse Morin, who established himself at Pointe a la Caille (Quail Point) (St. Thomas, where his descendants carry the name Morin-Valcourt.); Marie, the first native Canadian to embrace the sisterhood of Charity at Montreal: she has written the annals of the Hotel-Dieu of this village" (Cf. Ferland, Notes sur les registres de Notre Dame de Quebec p. 29) The honorable Auguste Norbert Morin, publisher and statesman, is descended from the branch of this family established in the county of Bellechasse.

MOUFLET

Jean Mouflet dit Champagne, fils de Jean (Mouflet) et de Sebastienne Girard du bourge du Mortagne, Charente-Inferieur, eveche de Xaintes. Soldat de Carignan (cie Varennes) Baptise 1646-1648. Marie a Anne Bodin Quebec 19 August 1669 (Contrat Becquet, 17 Aout 1669) (Memoires de la Societe Genealogique Canadienne-Francaise, IV, (1950-51), p. 8, in an article by Antoine Champagne-Beauregard. Sources for his article include Sulte's Histoire des Canadiens-Francais, and Roy and Malchelosse's Le Regiment de Carignan.)

Translation: Jean Mouflet dit Champagne, son of Jean (Mouflet) and Sebastienne Girard, of the village of Mortagne, Charente-Inferieur, diocese of Xaintes, France. Soldier of Carignan's regiment (Cie Varennes). Baptised in 1646-48. Married to Anne Bodin at Quebec 19 August 1669 (Becquet's contract, 17 August 1669).
